












The Jasper County Economic Development Organization, Inc. (JCEDO) is the county-wide economic development entity for Jasper County, Indiana. Incorporated in 1986 as a 501(c)3 corporation, JCEDO's purposes include:

To promote and stimulate agricultural, business, civic, commercial, financial, industrial, recreation, residential, tourism, and trade interests;

To strive to achieve maximum employment and wealth creation in Jasper County through the attraction of new businesses and residents, the expansion of existing businesses, marketing of the County and its unique attributes, public policy advocacy, and strategic economic planning and related public infrastructure investment.

COUNTY HIGHLIGHTS

The third largest county in Indiana at 560 square miles, Jasper County is strategically located in the northwest quadrant of the state adjacent to the Indiana portion of the Chicago metropolitan area to the north as well as halfway between Chicago and Indianapolis to the south. Originally inhabited as long ago as 500 B.C., and opened for settlement in 1832, the county has evolved from its rural beginnings into a diverse community of 33,478 people. Today, Jasper County is:

- The leading agriculture producing county in the state with the market value of product sold in 2007 at \$293,544,000;
- \$ Home to a strong industrial base with a mix of manufacturing and processing, distribution and logistics, and R&D related companies;

- \$ Growing in the northern portion of the County as and businesses and residents relocate from urbanized areas in Chicago and northwest Indiana;
- **\$** Growing in the central and southern portions of the County as businesses establish or expand facilities to take advantage of the outstanding work force, excellent transportation access, and competitive operating costs;
- **\$** Prosperous and committed to responsible economic growth through business, residential and institutional expansion and attraction.

The City of Rensselaer (pop. 5859) is the county seat. Other incorporated communities include the Town of DeMotte (pop. 3814), the Town of Remington (pop. 1185) and the Town of Wheatfield (pop. 853). In addition, total population growth countywide has increased 11.43 percent since 2000 and is projected to grow to 35,206 by 2020.

Jasper County is committed to aggressively support existing business expansion and new business and residential attraction. Several of the benefits of a Jasper County location include:

- \$ Excellent transportation access to customers and suppliers throughout the Midwest and nationally with five interchanges along I-65 as well as Class 1 Railroad service;
- **\$** A highly productive work force evidenced by award winning facilities operated by companies such as ConAgra, Donaldson and Monsanto;
- **\$** A plentiful and cost-effective supply of energy;
- Exceptional buildings and shovel ready sites in quality business parks;
- **\$** An attractive and stable tax and regulatory environment at the state, county and local levels.

The County was named to honor Sergeant William Jasper, a young Continental Army scout during the Revolutionary War - who on June 28, 1776, rescued the American Flag after it was shot down during the bombardment of Fort Moultrie in

South Carolina. While under attack, Jasper nailed the flag to a broken staff and raised it thus signaling that the Fort had not been captured. He later died during the Siege of Savannah in 1779.

DELIGHTFUL LIVING

A wide variety of lifestyle choices are available to people who live and work in Jasper County. The predominant character of the area is rural small town America. Each of the four incorporated municipalities located in Jasper County offers its own

unique attributes - from a feeling of exurbia in the **DeMotte** area, to


a traditional farming community in **Remington**, to a county seat environment in Rensselaer, to a neighborhood village in Wheatfield.

And for those that prefer the amenities available from major metropolitan area living, Downtown Chicago is only 66 miles from the County's northern border and its northwestern Indiana suburbs are

only minutes away. For those that enjoy a more mid-sized community with a world-class university oriented culture, the Lafayette-West Lafayette metro area is only 25 minutes from the County's southern border.

Jasper County Hospital is in the process of a \$17 million expansion that includes both a major increase in

square footage as well as a modernization of its medical treatment capabilities. The highlights of the project are a 26,750 sq. ft. addition to the existing 93,350 sq. ft. hospital building, the addition of four new operating rooms and expanded post-operative recovery area, a fixed-base MRI, and expansion of the outpatient services area.

The 18-month project is expected to be complete in late 2011.

The Kankakee Valley School Corporation is nearing completion of its new \$46 mil-

lion, 1500-student Middle School as well as making capital improvements to its other schools. Rensselaer Central School Corporation is proceeding with construction of a new \$15 million, 550-student Elementary School with opening scheduled in August, 2012.







The City of Rensselaer, one of only three municipalities in the State of Indiana to operate electric, natural gas, water, and wastewater utilities is making substantial capital investments in upgrading both its water and wastewater treatment and transportation systems including a major initiative to extend services out to the I-65 - State Route 114 Interchange. The Town of DeMotte, the largest municipality in the State of Indiana without water service, is building a water utility with service expected to be operational sometime in 2012. The Town of Remington is preparing to develop a Downtown Improvement Plan to capitalize on the opportunities presented by the opening in early 2011 of Advance Auto Parts' new 360-370 employee, 566,000 sq. ft. logistics and distribution facility.

ECONOMIC BASE

Jasper County has a strong and diversified economy comprised of a combination of successful agribusiness, manufacturing, distribution, institutional, and commercial employers. In 2009, there were 835 firms in the county employing 11,590 people. While 74.2 percent of all firms had under 10 employees, 53.5 percent of total employment was concentrated in the 5.7 percent of firms employing 50 or more.




Employment By Industry

Tri-County School Corporation provides K-12 education in southern Jasper County through 1 Elementary and 1 Intermediate School, and Tri-County Middle-Senior High School.

Covenant Christian High has 101 students and a 95.7% graduation rate. **DeMotte Christian** serves pre-school - 8th grade and **Saint Augustine** serves pre-school - 5th grade.

Logistics

A location in the heart of the Midwest with excellent proximity to markets and vendors across the supply chain are competitive advantages experienced by entities operating in Jasper County. In addition to an optimum geographic position, outstanding transportation infrastructure exists in the County and region to facilitate the movement of goods, services and people.


Highways: Interstate 65 is the principal north-south corridor with Exits at mile markers 201, 205, 215, 220, and 230. U.S. Highways 24 and 231 also serve the County as do State Routes 10, 14, 16, 49, 110, and 114.

Class 1 Railroads: The CSX and the Norfolk Southern operate in Jasper County. The Toledo, Peoria and Western (TPW) Railway runs a short line including an

inter-model facility at the County's southeastern border. In addition, Amtrak provides passenger rail ser-

vice via its Cardinal Train.

Airports: Jasper County Airport offers 4000' and 2400' runways as well as fixed based operator service through Excel-Air. Commercial airports




Jasper County Transportation Map

serving Jasper County include Indianapolis International Airport, GaryChicago International Airport, Midway International Airport, and O'Hare International Airport.


Port Access: The Port of Indiana - Burns Harbor facility is located less than 1 hour north on Lake Michigan.

Jasper County is located in the Central Time Zone.




Patterns





Indiana Interstate Highway Map




PEOPLE

The **Total Population** of Jasper County on April 1, 2010 was **33,478**, a **11.43 Percent Growth Rate** from the 2000 population of 30,039. Jasper County's population is projected to increase to **35,206 by 2020**. Its population in 1990 was 24,823.


AGE BY PERCENT



There were **16,101 Females** and **16,091 Males** with the **Median Age** at **36.1** years. White non-Hispanics numbered **30,988** representing **92.6** percent with the largest minority group being Hispanics at **1823** and **5.4** percent.

The Marital Status of the population over 15 years of age includes 15,632 Now Married (61%), 6,138 Never Married (23.9%), 2,271 Divorced (8.9%), 1,450 Widowed (5.7%), and 151 Separated (.5%).


There are 12,379 Total Households in the County including 9,307 Family Households (75.2%) and 3,072 Non-Family Households (24.8%). Average Household Size is 2.48 and the Average Family Size is 2.84.



Occupied Housing Units encompass 92.9 percent of the County's 13,168 Total Housing Units with Owner Occupied Units representing 76.7 percent and Renter Occupied Units representing 23.3 percent.

The Homeowner Vacancy Rate is 1.9 percent and the Rental Vacancy Rate 2.9 percent. Jasper County's Median Owner Occupied Home Value is \$138,700 with Median Rent \$630 monthly.

Their commitment to a stable and favorable tax and regulatory environment is designed to stimulate growth and investment. In fact, Indiana ranks 4th in the nation for job creation and economic growth.

Jasper County has consistently demonstrated its partnership with businesses through the **Property Tax Abatement Program** (to 10 years), use of **Tax Increment Financing (TIF)**, and maintaining an average countywide property tax rate of \$4.25 per \$100 of Assessed Valuation.

INDIANA TAX INCENTIVES

CORPORATE INVENTORY TAX — none.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT FOR A GROWING ECONOMY (EDGE) TAX CREDIT — negotiated and refundable for new job creation for up to 10 years.

GROSS RECEIPTS TAX — none.

HOOSIER BUSINESS INVESTMENT (HBI) TAX CREDIT — negotiated for up to 10 % of investment in new buildings, improvements and equipment and may be carried forward 9 years.

HOOSIER HEADQUARTERS RELOCATION TAX CREDIT — for 1/2 the cost incurred for companies with revenue of \$100 million or more.

PATENT INCOME EXEMPTION — 50 % (to \$5 million per year) for 5 years decreasing to 10 % in 10th year.

RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT TAX CREDIT — equals 15 % of increased R&D expenses on the first \$1 million of investment over prior 3-year base and may be carried forward 10 years.

INDIANA TAXES

Corporate Income Tax — 8.5% and apportioned using Single-Sales Factor on company sales in Indiana.

FUEL TAXES — combined federal, state and local rates per gallon: Diesel - \$.692/Gasoline - \$.501.

Personal Income Tax — 3.4 % plus a Local Option Income Tax for Jasper County Residents of 3.05 %.

PROPERTY TAXES — both Real and Personal Property assessed at 100 % of market value. Tax Caps based on Assessed Value — Homeowners 1 %, Apartments/Agricultural Land 2 %, Business Properties 3 %.

SALES AND USE TAX -7% with exemptions for new R&D Equipment, Manufacturing (raw materials/equipment/utilities), and Wholesale (items used directly in production/sales in interstate commerce).

UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE — the New Employer Rate is 2.5 % on a Taxable Wage Base of \$9,500 and paid for 36 months; after which a merit rate is calculated.

Worker's Compensation — average rates by group per \$100 of payroll include: Contracting \$4.06, Goods & Services \$1.93, Manufacturing \$2.22, Miscellaneous \$3.83, Office \$.26, and All Classes Average \$1.42.
